## 9 Amendments to Facebook Pages

As can be seen from the lack of a Facebook Moderator's Report, and our Chairman's substitute report, there have been problems with our Facebook pages. Our Chairman's Christmas message to members and to other Witheridge/Wetheridge people didn't appear on either of our two Facebook pages – the closed page for WFHS members only, listed as Witheridge Family History Society, or the open-to-all WitheridgeFhs page. We were also unable to post other greetings, including those for Anzac Day and Thanksgiving Day. Because of confusion between the similar names, we are in the process of renaming the WitheridgeFhs (open page), as Witheridge & Wetheridge descendants. We have yet to confirm a name for the closed page. We are planning to update both pages with news, information, and new, more relevant photos, and are inviting offers from members who already have Facebook pages to act as joint Administrators. We hope all members will register a 'like' for both these revised pages, and that non-member descendants will also 'like' the Descendants page.

## 10 WFHS Christmas Card for 2019

As agreed last year, we will be asking Hannah Shingler to design a card for us. We have now resolved the technical problems experienced in previous years, which arose because of incompatibility between Hannah's processes and those of Vistaprint. # AGM & Reunion 2019 – Voting & Absentee Voting

All full members, and additional family members over the age of 16 who are covered by that membership, are entitled to vote, provided the membership is fully paid up at the date of the meeting.

Any voting member unable to attend may register an absentee vote by post or e-mail. **All absentee votes must be received at least four full days before the meeting, ie, by Tuesday 8 May, 2018.** Postal votes must be sent to the Hon. Life President at 135 Kings Road, Biggin Hill, Westerham, Kent TN16 3NH in a sealed envelope clearly marked 'Postal Vote'. Votes registered via e-mail must be sent to amykennedy.ask@gmail.com, with 'Absentee Vote' in the subject box. Votes received by this mail box will be printed off and taken to the meeting, but neither these, nor the postal votes, will be counted until the votes of those present at the meeting have been cast. Should more than one vote be received from a member, only the last received for that member will be counted.

Any AGM motion concerning the Constitution requires a two-thirds majority of votes cast in order to be passed, but other motions can be passed by a simple majority. In the event of an equal number of votes being cast for and against a motion (except motions amending the Constitution) the Chairman of the meeting has a casting vote.

For those thinking of coming to the Witheridge Family Reunion, why not make it a Witheridge Weekend? Here are some suggestions for places of interest to visit, and places to stay.

## PLACES TO VISIT

### Biggin Hill Memorial Museum & St George's Chapel

The new Biggin Hill Memorial Museum, located on Main Road, Biggin Hill, TN16 3EJ, which opened in January, tells the story of Britain's most famous WW2 RAF fighter station through the personal experiences of those who served there, and the community which supported them. It's on the same site as the St George's RAF Chapel of Remembrance, built in 1951 to preserve the legacy of those who served and died in the Biggin Hill sector during WW2.

The Chapel features a reredos listing all those who died, as well as a Book of Remembrance and 12 beautiful stained-glass windows. The Museum holds an extensive collection of documents, photos and other memorabilia relating to the Battle of Britain and associated events.



An admission ticket also gives access to a discovery tablet, providing additional story-telling, using special films and photos, with both audio description and subtitles. Admission also allows visitors to explore St George's Chapel, gardens, café and shop. Coach and car parking is available on site and nearby, and there is also a buggy store, cycle parking, picnic area, shop and wi-fi.

The Museum is open Wednesday-Sunday, 10.00 am–5.00 pm, last admission at 4.00 pm. Admission\* is £7.50 (£8.50) for adults, £4.00 (£4.50) for children, and free for under 5s. The Chapel is also open Tuesdays-Sundays, from 10.00 am. Postcode for both: Main Road, Biggin Hill, TN16 3EJ.

### Biggin Hill Heritage Hangar



The Heritage Hangar, at 204 Churchill Way, Biggin Hill TN16 3BN, was founded in 2011 to house the activities of the Spitfire Company (Biggin Hill) Ltd, intending to restore a single Spitfire. It has now completed its sixth Spitfire restoration, and tours enable visitors to observe how current restorations are progressing, as well as getting up close to the Spitfires, a Hurricane Harvard and a Piper Cub. Currently, there is also a Messerschmitt 109e on site.

A tour of the Heritage Hangar costs from £39.00 and, with a chance to sit in a Spitfire thrown in, it's £69.00. For those wanting the full VIP Technical Tour, the cost is from £140.00.

### Down House

For 40 years from 1842, Charles Darwin and his family lived at Down House, Luxted Road, Downe BR6 7TJ. Here, in the house and garden, he worked on his theories of natural selection as part of the evolutionary process. Although largely rebuilt between 1778 and 1782, the house has elements of the earlier building, thought to date from the 1650s.



Run by English Heritage, Down House is open from April-October, 10.00 am – 6.00 pm. Entrance\* is free to members of English Heritage. For non-members, its £12.40 (£14.00) for adults, £7.60 (£8.40) for children 5-17, £11.40 (12.60), for over-65s or student-card holders, and £33.00 (£36.40) for a family ticket (2 adults + up to 3 children). A special Overseas Visitor Pass (9 or 16 day unlimited) is available from English Heritage.

### Quebec House

Quebec House, in Quebec Square, Westerham, Kent TN16 1TD, was the childhood home of General James Wolfe (1727-1759). Now restored by the National Trust, it includes contemporary furnishings showing how the Wolfe family lived, and Mrs Wolfe's kitchen, with the recipes and remedies she used. There are also two rooms full of documents and memorabilia relating the story of the Battle of Quebec, in which Wolfe led the British Army to victory over Montcalm and his French forces, ultimately enabling the unification of Canada. Wolfe himself died from gunshot wounds inflicted as the French troops fled. In the grounds, the coach house has an indoor seating area with a

café selling tea and home-made cakes, as well as a shop selling souvenirs and second-hand books.

Admission\* to house, gardens and exhibition is £5.90 (£6.50) for adults, £2.90 (£3.25) for children, family £14.50 (£16.25) and adult groups, minimum 15, £5.50 each. There is no parking on site, but parking is available in the nearby.

### Chartwell House

Chartwell House, at Mapleton Road, Westerham, Kent TN16 1PS, was the home of Winston Churchill and his family from 1922. The rooms remain much as they were during his lifetime, with pictures, books, and personal mementoes. The sloping gardens include the lakes he created, the kitchen garden, the playhouse designed for his youngest daughter Mary, and Winston's studio.



Admission\* to the garden and studio only is £9.00 (£10.00) for adults, children, and £22.50 (£25.00) for family. Admission\* courtesy National Trust £4.50 (£5.00) for

including the house, is £15.50 (£17.20) for adults, £7.75 (£8.60) for children, and £38.75 (£43.00) for family. Visitor reception, garden, and shop open at 10.00 am, house at 11.30 am and studio at 12 noon. Visits to the house are by timed tickets, which can be bought in advance, online or by phone, or on the day at the visitor centre. Free parking for NT members, non-members £4.00 per day. ## Chairman's Report

Condolences have been sent to his widow, Maureen, on behalf of the Witheridge FHS. Roy and Kim Cook had hoped to attend the funeral, and represent the Witheridge FHS but, as the result of an emergency in Roy's family, this proved to be impossible. However, we did make a contribution to Cancer Research UK in memory of Richard. A full obituary will be included in our next Newsletter, but I would like to record here the enormous debt the Society owes Richard for his willing service across 30 years in key roles on our Committee, and his valuable contribution to our research records.

I must also thank Pamela Glynn and Alison Smith who have served faithfully on the Committee for many years, but with advancing years feel they can no longer continue in post.

## Research Co-ordinator's Report

Sadly, this year there has again been no new information from members, but there is still plenty to do in unravelling different branches that moved to the same villages or towns. Currently, I'm looking particularly into the many such branches in the **South Hams** area. I'm preparing an article on this which I hope will be ready for the next *NEWSLETTER*.

Another task has involved exploring the marriage links between one of the **South Hams** branches and the **Wembury** branch. It proved very difficult to produce a family tree showing how each branch is linked by marriage to the Rickard family, and probably also to the Bonney family, both from St Ewe in Cornwall, but I've finally managed it. This tree shows how current member Maxine Neale, and former member Gina Couch, from one of the South Hams branches, are linked to me, Jason, Brenda Dixon, Rod Witheridge and Sue Witheridge. I hope this tree, with an accompanying article will also be published soon.

As mentioned last year, I've been printing off parish register documents and illustrations to insert at appropriate places into the main pedigree files for each family, and these will be on display at the Reunion.

It's been disappointing not to have received any new items for the **Witheridges Remembered** project. Unless we record the memories that have been, and are being, handed down orally in each family, they risk being forgotten, distorted, or both.

Finally, we need to consider the opportunities provided by **DNA testing**. It would be interesting to know how many of our members and/or their Witheridge relatives, have taken DNA tests, and with which organisation. Sometimes it's difficult to identify the connections with people listed as DNA matches. If WFHS members from the same original branch were to compare notes, it might help identify which links are with people of Witheridge descent. My own test results (from an Ancestry test) have linked me with Witheridge descendants whose surnames I recognised through the marriages of female Witheridges, but whose existence I hadn't previously known about. I've also managed to identify some matches I believe are probably non-Witheridge, but I'm still wading through over 170 other unidentified matches, believed to be 4<sup>th</sup> cousins or closer, and one of which could be Witheridge links.

# Facebook Moderator's Report

Regrettably, for some time we have been unable to make contact with our Facebook Moderator, and have received no official Report. The following report is from our Chairman:

Committee members have recognised that for many months there has been no activity on either of our Facebook pages. Even my own post, as Chairman, sending Christmas greetings to all, was not uploaded. As no-one else on the Committee has Moderator access, we have no option but to start again.

The Committee is now in the process of opening up two replacement pages. The open-to-all page will now be called Witheridge & Wetheridge descendants. This will distinguish it from the former pages, and also avoid confusion with any pages relating to the village of Witheridge. Finding a title for the closed WFHS page will take some thought, as we cannot use a name already in use (e.g. our previous closed page). We will have to choose something instantly recognisable, but not likely to be confused with any other page.

We would also like to appoint three Administrators, who would each have the authority to upload, edit, or reject posts. With three people, we should be able to make what is currently a very light load even lighter, and avoid repeating our current situation.

To ensure that our pages comply with UK GDPR laws, it would be wise to have UK residents as at least two of our Administrators, but the third could be from anywhere. I would welcome offers from members who already have Facebook pages to help us with this.

# Webmaster's Report

Recent changes to the webpage include:

- Change from http: to https: (secure/encrypted). The site was attacked a few years ago.
- Converted all icons/symbols to a standard that should improve compatibility with other devices.
- Upgraded ZenPhoto the picture viewing app.
- Some significant changes to the drop down menus for use on phones/small tablets.
